RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA)... RCIA is the process of welcoming new members to the Catholic Church. It is intended for adults who have never been baptized or for adults who have been baptized Christian and now wish to practice the faith in the Catholic tradition. It is an ongoing process of formation, catechesis and liturgical rites. Anyone interested is asked to call the rectory to discuss the process.

SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM... Parents are asked to call the parish office to register for the Baptismal Preparation Meeting and for the baptism of their child. Parents are expected to be participating members of the parish.

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE... Couples seeking to be married in the Church are to make arrangements with the pastor six months to one year in advance of their intended wedding date, in order to allow time for marriage preparation. At least one of the engaged should be a registered and practicing member of the parish.

ANointing OF THE SICK... The Sacrament of the Sick is for the spiritual comfort, strength and healing of the ill. If there is a need for the sacrament in your family or household, please contact the rectory as soon as possible.

Scripture Corner

JESUS IS OUR GOOD SHEPHERD

The shepherd theme plays a large role in salvation history. Even today we speak about the pastor in a parish. "Pastor" is the Latin word for shepherd. From the time of Abraham until the Exodus the Hebrew people were shepherds. Certainly they were impressed by the loving care shepherds gave to their sheep. They would even risk their lives for the sheep. So it is not surprising to read "The Lord is my shepherd." (Psalm 23: 1) They were convinced of God's great love for them.

The Jewish people also applied the term shepherds to their leaders, not always good leaders. God says, "Woe to the shepherds of Israel who have been pasturing themselves! Should not the shepherds pasture the flock?" (Ezekiel 34: 2) God shows his great love for the people when he continues, "I myself will pasture my sheep." (Ezekiel 34: 15) Finally, looking forward to the future, God adds, "I will appoint one shepherd over them to pasture them, my servant David; he shall pasture them and be their shepherd." (Ezekiel 34: 23)

Jesus says in today's Gospel (John 10: 11 – 18) "I am the good shepherd." He is laying claim to being the messiah-shepherd of the family of David. He shows that he is the good shepherd by his care for all people, Jews and Gentiles: "I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold." (vs. 16) But our Lord goes far beyond Old Testament concepts of the shepherd. He will in fact lay down his life for his flock and take it up again. He does that by his crucifixion and resurrection. Jesus performs that saving action because, as Christ says, "This command I have received from my Father." (vs. 18)

Our Lord has wonderfully comforting words for his followers down through the ages: "I am the good shepherd, and I know mine and mine know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father; and I will lay down my life for the sheep." (vss. 14, 15) This "knowing," given the Semitic language background, indicates a very intimate relationship. It calls to mind the amazing words of Jesus, "As the Father loves me, so I also love you." (John 15: 9) To me that is one of the greatest verses in the Bible.

**St. Mary’s Queen of Peace Cemetery
Memorial Installation**

All are welcome to attend the installation of a blessed Plaque honoring the sacred memory of the Enslaved Men and Women buried throughout the Archdiocese of Washington. Fr. David Beaubien will preside over the plaque installation ceremony at St. Mary’s Queen of Peace Cemetery, 38888 Dr. Johnson Road, Mechanicsville, on Saturday, May 5th at 10:00AM.

Although there are no burials of enslaved persons at Queen of Peace, the plaque invites cemetery visitors to remember and pray for those who await their resurrection in Christ in unknown graves anywhere within the boundaries of the Archdiocese.

When he blessed the plaques at a special Mass in February, Cardinal Wuerl said, *“our brothers and sisters in the faith who were enslaved, who lived in human bondage, were treated with the same inequity at their burial. Many received no public marker... what we have come here to do today is to see that here and now all are properly remembered....Grant that these stones, placed in memory of those who suffered in terrible bondage, may, by the power of your blessing, mark a place of rest and hope.”*
